ARCHITECTURE STUDY ABROAD PROGRAMS (Semester and Academic Year)

The School of Architecture, Design and Planning has established formal arrangements with the University of Cardiff in Wales; the University of Nottingham in Nottingham, England, Sheffield University, in Sheffield, England; the University of Newcastle, in Newcastle, England; Bartlett Faculty of the Built Environment, University College of London, in London, England; the Edinburgh College of Art in Edinburgh, Scotland; the University of Newcastle in Newcastle, Australia; the University of New South Wales in Sydney, Australia the University of Stuttgart in Stuttgart, Germany;; the University of Applied Sciences in Potsdam, near Berlin, Germany; and the University of Copenhagen, Denmark.

Students selected for Potsdam and Stuttgart will be required to attend an intensive language course in Vienna in the summer prior to the fall term in Germany. Although no previous language training is necessary to attend the summer course, it would be helpful. All other programs are conducted in English, including Copenhagen.

Students should arrive in Scotland about September 15. Exchange students to Stuttgart should arrive about September 1, if they must take the intensive language course to pass the university language exam. Travel through Europe, however, is an important benefit, and students are encouraged to do as much of it as possible. The Danish International Study Program (D.I.S.) is from approximately August 25 - December 22 (for the fall term) and January 20 - May 19 (for the spring term). The Autumn Academy in Neukloster takes place in late October/early November.

SELECTION OF PARTICIPANTS

The intent form (at the end of this document) is to be completed and returned by Friday, November 13, 2009. To be eligible to apply for these semester or academic year programs a student must maintain an acceptable GPA over the period preceding the application. As a general policy a 3.25 GPA (average of cum and studio GPA) is recommended.

Criteria for selection includes: an evaluation of the academic record, including design studio, verbal and written communication ability, and extracurricular activities. A portfolio of design work is required. All candidates are required to submit an essay (essay guidelines included at the end of this document) of no more than 1000 words and a personal resume. The resume should contain information on such things as involvement in voluntary organizations and pursuits, past employment, honors and awards and anything else that may be of interest and aid to the selection committee. All application materials are to be submitted as PDF documents in duplicate (2 separate cds) in digital format. **The submission of application materials for the Bartlett, England program is to be made in Room 108 Lippincott Hall (The Office of Study Abroad) by 5:00 p.m. by Tuesday, December 1, 2009. Candidates will need to visit with area coordinator Professor Bill Carswell before submitting application materials for the Bartlett, England program. The submission of application materials for all other programs is to be made in Room 108 Lippincott Hall (The Office of Study Abroad) by 5:00 p.m. on Friday, January 15, 2010.** In addition to submitting application materials, candidates will need to visit personally, by appointment, with the area coordinators for the program they are applying for.

Decisions for all programs will be made and candidates notified by letter no later than Friday, February 12, 2010. Selected students (Fall and Academic Year) are asked to attend "ORIENTATION FOR STUDENTS GOING ABROAD" at the Office of Study Abroad on April 24, 2010. For students selected for the Spring semester, "ORIENTATION FOR STUDENTS GOING ABROAD" will take place on December 4, 2010.

Students selected for a semester or year-long program will need to fill out their Study Abroad Advising Form, go over it with their [study abroad] advisor, get his/her signature, and provide a copy of the signed form to **Barb Seba** in the Architecture Department Office prior to departure for the program.

THE EWART SCHOLARSHIPS

The Donald P. Ewart Memorial Traveling Scholarship was established in the early 1970s. Donald Ewart was a student of architecture at the University of Kansas who, while traveling around the world, became ill and died. His parents, after his death, maintained contact with the school and upon their deaths bequeathed their estate to the school for the purpose of travel. Since that time, several hundred students have received scholarships to study and travel internationally and the United States. Among other activities, the scholarship allows selected students to study in a foreign nation. Following the time abroad, students having performed satisfactorily, return to the University of Kansas and graduate with their original class.

Students who are accepted to study abroad are eligible to be considered for a Donald P. Ewart Memorial Traveling Scholarship. Students who are awarded a Ewart Scholarship, have completed a FAFSA and have unmet financial need, may be considered for additional Ewart funds. Students who have previously studied abroad and received a Ewart Scholarship, may be ineligible to receive an additional Ewart Scholarship.

ADDITIONAL FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Normally, federal financial aid is applicable to study abroad programs. In most cases, KU scholarships and grants apply to study abroad. Limited scholarships from the Office of Study Abroad are available to qualified applicants in many programs, including qualified Ewart Scholarship recipients. The deadline to apply for scholarships through the Office of Study Abroad is March 1, 2010 for and October 1, 2010 for Spring Semester Programs.

VOLUNTARY WITHDRAWAL

Students who are selected and contracted for one of these Programs and subsequently voluntarily withdraw from the Program after commencing study abroad may incur delays in their education, may forfeit committed tuition and fees and may be required to return all Scholarship monies from the University.

The University is located on a well-designed green-field, large campus that has made a special effort to recruit internationally and has a large international student body. The research activities include several full-size dwellings constructed on-campus for energy-consumption testing. The University has a strong research graduate program. Like most UK schools, studio is the primary learning class with support classes tailored for studio. The School campus is about three miles from downtown Nottingham and Nottingham is about an hour from London by train.

The University of Newcastle offers students the perfect combination of lifestyle and learning. Newcastle is well known for its academic excellence and innovative teaching. The University's setting and relaxed atmosphere combine to offer an excellent environment for academic pursuits and personal development. The university was established in 1965 and has 23,000 students. The Callaghan is set on 300 acres of natural bushland complete with Australian wildlife. Newcastle is on the east coast of New South Wales and is located 2.5 hour north from Sydney. Newcastle is a down-to-earth Australian city that combines a country setting with the advantages of city living. The city is known for beautiful beaches, a low cost of living and a favorable climate. Being Australia's second oldest city, Newcastle is a city rich with cultural heritage. It has a population of 350,000 and all the usual city attractions, including restaurants, cafes, parks, gardens, theaters, art galleries, shopping centers and nightclubs. Newcastle enjoys a pleasant climate year round similar to the central California coast. The semester program at the University of Newcastle during KU's spring semester is from mid-February to end of June with a mid-semester break in mid April. KU students would take a studio course and architecture electives, earning 15-18 hours for the semester.

The School of Architecture and Built Environment at the University of Newcastle has an international reputation for pioneering problem-based learning and research-led learning for its undergraduate built environment program. The architecture program uses a mixture of problem based learning, design studio tutoring and traditional teaching. Design Studio courses use an innovative problem based approach to learning wherein a range of concerns (technical, ecological, historical and managerial) are integrated into the process of architectural design. In parallel with the Design Studio a range of courses support the development of essential skills and focused knowledge. These courses are in the areas of construction technology, construction ecology, communication, computing and the history and theory of architecture.

EDINBURGH COLLEGE OF ART, Scotland

With a population of approximately half a million people, Edinburgh is the capital city of Scotland, a country with a total population of nearly five million people and a land area of 30,000 square miles - one third the size of the state of Kansas!

Courses in architecture began in the city in the early part of the 20th century in the Department of Architecture at the Edinburg College of Art (ECA).

The College buildings lie just to the south of Edinburgh's famous castle, which rests on top of an extinct volcanic plug dominating the city center. The original castle buildings date from the seventh century when the Scottish King, Edwin made his capital there. (Edwin's Burgh has since become Edinburgh.)

In addition to the Department of Architecture the College of Art also houses the departments of Landscape Architecture, Town and Country Planning, and Art and Design.

The modern center of the city is located to the north of the castle and although its oldest buildings are over two hundred years old, the area is known as the 'New Town' in contrast to the 'Old Town' which originally developed between the castle and the palace at Holyrood a mile or so to the east.

The 'New Town' boasts the finest assembly of Georgian architecture to be found anywhere in the world. Its principal streets house the headquarters of many of the nation's financial and commercial institutions, while the surrounding area contains a mixture of professional offices and private residences. KU exchange students will stay in a residence hall of The University of Edinburgh.

With its rich architectural heritage and many fine museums, libraries and galleries, all of which can be reached easily on foot or by the extensive public transport system, Edinburgh is an excellent base for the study of architecture. The city has a very active cultural life which culminates each year in late August and early September in the Edinburgh International Festival of Music, Art and Drama.

The course which students will join differs from the one at KU in three principal ways:

1. All students take the same subjects.
2. Studio is not organized as a class but rather as a "home base" which is central to the course and which occupies all of the time outside formal lecture periods.
3. Students do not elect particular members of faculty but are taught by a team of faculty over the three terms of the academic year.

In addition to studio, classes normally taken are Architecture in Society, Advanced Building Technology (Construction, Environmental Systems and Structures), Building Economics, and an elective. Up to 36 credit hours may be allocated for these courses as follows:

Design III	12 hours credit
Architecture in Society III	6 hours credit
Advanced Building Technology 1*	6 hours credit
ARCH 626 Bldg. Tech I	3 hours credit
ARCH 359 Special Problems	3 hours credit
Building Economics	3 hours credit
Elective III	6 hours credit

* This course does not substitute for ARCE 670 Building Power Systems for Architects, ARCE 672 Building Interior Lighting or Architects, and ARCE 676 Building Acoustical Systems for Architects taught at the University of Kansas.

The tuition and housing fees paid at KU provide housing, food and tuition at the ECA. The school furnishes an apartment and money for food. Students may cook in the apartment or take meals at the University.

Classes at the ECA begin in the beginning of October and end in late June. Students should travel to Edinburgh around September 20th to make dormitory arrangements and to meet the head of the school. Kansas students traveling to Scotland pay tuition, fees, room and board and a Study abroad fee to the University of Kansas before they leave for Scotland. In Scotland, Kansas students pay for books and incidentals only, and may receive a Ewart travel scholarship from the School of Architecture and Urban Design at the University of Kansas.

KARLSRUHE INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY, Germany

On October 01, 2009, Universität Karlsruhe and Forschungszentrum Karlsruhe merged into one institution, the Karlsruhe Institute of Technology (KIT). KIT is an institution of internationally excellent research and teaching in natural and engineering sciences with 8000 employees and 18500 students. Its annual budget amounts to 700 million Euros. KIT focuses on the knowledge triangle of research – teaching – innovation. Prior to this year, KU students studied at Universität Karlsruhe, which was founded in 1825 as a Polytechnic University making it the oldest technical university in Germany. Even though the emphasis still lies on Engineering Studies, the Human, Social and Natural Sciences are nowadays represented as well. A total of over 300 professors teach and research at approximately 120 university faculties and institutions.

With a student population of around 18.500, Karlsruhe does not belong to the major German universities in terms of size however, it enjoys an outstanding reputation: the University has proven itself by achieving lead positions in several Academic Rankings conducted. In 2006, Karlsruhe won the excellence initiative, together with two other German Universities, thus being awarded the title Elite-University.

The Campus is located near the City centre. Lecture halls, libraries, laboratories and administration facilities are all within walking distance. Additionally, it is possible to travel longer distances with the public transport service. The Campus boasts many recreational areas and borders the local castle garden as well as the outskirts of the Hardtwald.

The exchange at Karlsruhe is available to students in the M.Arch I program.

Much of the information about Germany, German universities, and timetables for enrolling found in the Potsdam section applies to Karlsruhe, as well. The biggest difference in these universities and schools of architecture is that Potsdam is in eastern Germany near Berlin and Stuttgart and Karlsruhe are in southern Germany.

Students going to Karlsruhe will be provided a three-week intensive language instruction as well as a week-long orientation as part of their regular academic-year study. Students pay KU tuition and fees to pay for the incoming Karlsruhe student. Students may receive a Ewart travel scholarship and are eligible for the Baden-Württemberg scholarship, as Karlsruhe resides in the Baden-Württemberg district along with Stuttgart. This scholarship is run by Universität Stuttgart, which provides approximately €400 a month (or €4,400 for the year). 1-2 KU students a year may be selected to receive the scholarship, and students selected for study in Stuttgart or Karlsruhe should contact Justine Hamilton at the KU Office of Study Abroad to receive the application instructions.

M.Arch I students can expect to take a year of architectural design, if they choose, and additional technical requirements and professional electives in architecture. In addition, they may expect to get credit for language courses in German taken in Germany and Vienna. Students should expect to transfer back 30 to 40 hours of credit, depending on the courses they take.

One of the basic prerequisites to a successful year in Germany is knowledge of the German language. However, most KU students who study in Germany have NO German when they leave Kansas and pass the Karlsruhe language exam after taking intensive language courses in Vienna the summer prior to arriving in Stuttgart. Students pursuing this option must take three months of language study in Vienna in order to be admitted to the 3-week long intensive course at Karlsruhe in September. Students with some German language

proficiency are also encouraged to have some additional German language preparation for studying abroad in Karlsruhe. Students who believe their German proficiency is adequate without Karlsruhe's intensive language course must pass the Deutsche Sprachprüfung für den Hochschulzugang, DSH, proficiency exam before they can register.

It is possible to get up to 13 hours of credit for the summer study in Vienna. KU students usually take intensive German in Vienna from approximately May 31 to August 27 for 13 credits if they have no previous German language instruction. See Justine Hamilton in Study Abroad for details.

UNIVERSITY OF STUTTGART, Germany

The University of Kansas' School of Architecture, Design & Planning and the Universität Stuttgart signed an exchange agreement in 1994 to exchange three students per year. In Academic Year 1994-95, Kansas sent its first students to Stuttgart on this exchange.

The Universität Stuttgart has evolved into a center of future-oriented research and teaching; the former Technical University can draw upon experience in technical and natural sciences gained over 160 years, and, more recently also in the humanities and social sciences. This experience and the close tie between research and teaching permit the university to train students exceptionally well for future responsibilities in industry, government and business and to prepare them for leading positions in basic and applied research. The university, with its 130 institutes in 14 departments and 20,700 students is the largest institution of higher learning in the city of Stuttgart. The Department of Architecture has 2200 students.

The exchange at Stuttgart is available to students in the M.Arch I program.

Much of the information about Germany, German universities, and timetables for enrolling found in the Potsdam section applies to Stuttgart as well. The biggest difference in these universities and schools of architecture is that Potsdam is in eastern Germany near Berlin and Stuttgart is in southern Germany.

Students going to Stuttgart will be provided a one-month intensive language instruction as part of their regular academic-year study. Students pay KU tuition and fees to pay for the incoming Stuttgart student. Students may receive a Ewart travel scholarship and are eligible for the Baden-Wurtemberg scholarship, a scholarship program run by Universität Stuttgart, which provides approximately €400 a month (or €4,400 for the year). 1-2 KU students a year have been selected to receive the scholarship, and students selected for study in Stuttgart should contact Justine Hamilton at the KU Office of Study Abroad to receive the application instructions.

UNIVERSITY OF APPLIED SCIENCES, POTSDAM (BERLIN), Germany

The School of Architecture, Design and Planning established an exchange agreement with the University of Applied Sciences in Potsdam, near Berlin, Germany in 2007.

Following the reunification of Germany in 1989, five advanced technical colleges were founded in the state of Brandenburg. One of these was in the regional capital Potsdam, just a stone's throw from Berlin, the new capital of the Federal Republic of Germany: the University of Applied Sciences, Fachhochschule Potsdam (FHP). The profile of the FHP was shaped by a focus on an original combination of non-technical subjects and inter-faculty collaboration. The rationale for this was that the areas of overlap that exist between subjects should create new potential for innovative development. Studies at the University of Applied Sciences began in the winter semester of 1991/1992 with a total of 144 students in the Faculty of Social Work. In the winter semester of 1992/1993, the faculties of Architecture, Civil Engineering, Design and Archive/Library/Documentation studies were established.

In 1994, the first courses moved out of the Friedrich Ebert Strasse site in the city centre to the new campus in Pappelallee. By 2003, five buildings had been converted at the site of the former barracks compound and two new buildings had also been erected there: the International Congress Centre for Science, which serves as a "guesthouse" for scientific institutions in Potsdam and the university's laboratory and workshop complex. With a total area of 6000 square metres, the complex is home to studios for rapid prototyping, photo, sieve and book printing, workshops and laboratories for model making, woodwork, wall and stone restoration, material laboratories and examination rooms for students and teachers from the fields of Civil Engineering, Architecture and Urban Design, Conservation and Restoration and Design. The site offers excellent conditions for teaching as well as research and development. By the end of 2004, nearly 2,500 students were registered at FHP. Their educational needs are taken care of by 91 professors; 66 research associates, and 20 workshop and laboratory staff.

Students from Kansas are asked to enroll in two semesters of project design along with lecture, seminar, excursion and elective courses. The courses include, but are not limited to:

In addition to the above list, students are encouraged to enroll in classes offered by related departments such as urban planning, urban design and social and environmental studies. After the year's study and before leaving the FHP, KU students should request letters from their professors stating the course name, grade received, and student I.D. number.

One of the basic prerequisites to a successful year in Germany is the knowledge of German. However, most KU students who study in Germany have NO German when they leave Kansas. Students pursuing this option must take three months of language study in Vienna in the summer prior to their study in Germany in order to be admitted to Potsdam in October. Students with some German language proficiency are also encouraged to have some additional German language preparation for studying abroad in Potsdam, but it is not required. It is

possible to get up to 13 hours of German language credit by taking language courses in Vienna from approximately July 1 to September 31. See Justine Hamilton in Study Abroad for details.

Registration (Eintragen in Listen) for architecture classes of the various architecture departments (Lehrstühle) begins in the second week of October. Lectures (Vorlesungen) begin either in the second or third week of October. Although the FHP publishes periodically a very general catalog, important current course information such as lecture times, lecture rooms, syllabi, and new course offerings are posted on bulletin boards. Students should routinely check these boards for announcements and course changes. The official end of semester is in late July, although project deadlines may not correspond to the official end of lectures.

After arriving in Germany, students should see Prof. Baldus at the School of Architecture. He will help you with enrollment (Immatrikulation) and provide general advice. Within the first two weeks in Potsdam, students should register with the Foreigner's Administration (Ausländerbehörde) located at Potsdam's City Hall (Rathaus). The first step of registration is "Anmeldung", or registering your address. After Anmeldung you will receive a temporary resident permit (Bescheinigung) and the necessary forms to apply for a permanent resident permit.

Comments from KU Student Currently in Potsdam:

The facilities are incredible, and the whole school seems to function more as a whole, with less borders between faculties, and access to nearly everything (i.e. a 5 axis CNC mill, 3D plotting, laser cutter, wood and metal shops equipped with beautiful German engineered/maintained machines, photo labs, ceramics, print-making, etc.). The campus has a very Bauhaus-esque vibe. I think that most of the rapid prototyping capabilities are new, because when I had asked before I left they had nothing of the sort. Additionally, a major complex providing state of the art studio spaces and additional fabrication studios will be completed later this semester.

As fourth year students we are essentially considered 1st semester Master students, whose curriculum includes a "Betreuung freier Themen Entwurf" i.e. Free-themed Thesis Design.

Kansas students pay only for KU fees, insurance, room and board, books, and incidentals in Potsdam, Germany, and are eligible to receive a Ewart travel grant from the School of Architecture, Design & Planning at the University of Kansas. FHP waives all tuition costs.

UNIVERSITY OF COPENHAGEN/D.I.S., Denmark

In 1984, The University of Kansas, School of Architecture, Design & Planning established an agreement with the Danish International Studies Program (D.I.S.) to send 4th year students to Copenhagen for a Fall semester's study. Since that time over 100 students have participated in the Program, which is based at the University of Copenhagen with architectural faculty from The Royal Danish Academy of Fine Arts.

All instruction is in English and students are drawn from approximately 20 other English-speaking schools of architecture in the USA, Canada, Australia and Britain. A unique feature of the program is that students live with Danish host families during their period of study and thus acquire a deep understanding and personal experience of Danish culture. Another feature of the program is the integration of classroom teaching with weekly field study visits in Copenhagen and with two longer study tours of Western Denmark, Berlin and Amsterdam (in the fall) or Stockholm and Helsinki (in the spring).

INTERNATIONAL AUTUMN ACADEMY, NEUKLOSTER, Germany

In cooperation with the Universities of Dortmund, Utrecht, Potsdam, Kentucky and Kansas, the *Internationale Herbstakademie* is held annually in Neukloster, Germany in late October or early November. Students and faculty from these schools spend a week in the northern lake district of Mecklenburg, Germany focused on a single conference theme, such as “Architecture and Music,” “Anonymous Architecture,” or “Building and Art.” Recent themes have focused on urban design in nearby Wismar. English will be the principal spoken language.

Up to six KU students (in addition to those already selected for study abroad at Potsdam, Stuttgart, Karlsruhe and Copenhagen) will be able to participate.

Students will be expected to engage in preparatory readings before the trip as part of a three credit hour course that they will enroll in, arrange to miss up to one week of regular KU classes in October or November, participate fully in the academy, engage in follow-up research and prepare a report or presentation upon return.

To apply, students must be currently at the 3rd or 4th year studio level in the M.Arch I program.
